Bethune and District Overview

The Bethune and District community consists of the villages of Bethune and Findlater, and the Rural Municipality of Dufferin No. 190. Bethune offers residents administrative services (volunteer fire department, ambulance, first responders), commercial services (Co-op, credit union, insurance, restaurants), educational facilities (public library, K-8 school), and recreational facilities (sports centre, rink, baseball diamonds, community hall, senior centre). Residents must travel to Regina Beach for medical services, and the nearest RCMP detachment and high school is in Lumsden. The K+S Bethune Potash Mine (formerly known as the Legacy Project) broke ground in 2012. The mine is located on the edge of Buffalo Pound, between the communities of Bethune and Findlater. The mine became a fully-commissioned mine in 2017 and brought to the region approximately 300 permanent jobs. At a cost of \$4.1 Billion, the Bethune solution mine is the largest project/investment ever undertaken by this German company.

Village of Bethune

Size and Location

The Village of Bethune is a community of 399 people located in the south-central part of Saskatchewan.

- The land area of the Village of Bethune is 1.04 square kilometers, and the population density is 383.1 people per square kilometer.
- Bethune is situated in the Rural Municipality of Dufferin, 56 kilometers northwest of Regina on Highway 11. It is considered to be a bedroom community for Regina.
- The village is nestled amidst some beautiful waterways. Arm River flows along a river valley north of Bethune and features picturesque camping sites, and the Qu'Appelle River is a short way south. Last Mountain Lake is to the northeast; Buffalo Pound Lake - southwest.

Facts about Bethune

- The post office in Bethune was established June 5th 1905, three months before Saskatchewan became a province. The village takes its name from C.B. Bethune, the engineer on the first train to travel the railway in 1887.
- The Gillis Blakley Bethune and District Heritage Museum is a Municipal Heritage Property on the Canadian Register of Historic Places.
- The Community is served by the Clive Draycott Elementary school and in 2017 it had 90 students. Students in grades 9-12 travel to Lumsden to attend classes there.
- The Bethune and District History Society published the title *Wagon Trails to Blacktop* in 1983 and a second volume is now published as well.
- The assessment value for the Village of Bethune is \$52,277,900.

- Findlater is 75 kilometers northwest of the city of Regina on Highway 11, between Bethune and Chamberlain.
- The land area of the Village of Findlater is 1.2 square kilometers, and the population density is 37.5 people per square kilometer.
- Findlater is situated in the Rural Municipality of Dufferin No. 190.

RM of Dufferin No. 190

Size and Location

The Rural Municipality of Dufferin is a community of 559 people located in the south-central part of Saskatchewan.

- The municipality is much larger than an average RM.
- Running through the extreme south of the RM is the Qu'Appelle Valley (Buffalo Pound), while the Little Arm Valley winds through the north side to enter Last Mountain Lake.
- The land area of the RM is 957.04 square kilometers, and the population density is 0.6 people per square kilometer.
- The RM of Dufferin encompasses the communities of Bethune, Findlater, and the resort village of North Grove.
- The office for the RM is located in the Village of Bethune.

Facts about the RM of Dufferin

- The Rural Municipality of Dufferin No. 190 was founded on January 6, 1913, when the first meeting was held.
- The roads crossing both the Qu'Appelle Valley and Arm River Valley have been difficult to build and many bridges have been constructed. Road and bridge maintenance have been the prime interest of the RM council.
