Our Path to Reopening – June 2020

Employees are actively working on everything needed to move into this next step of the plan, and we are doing everything possible to help ensure the health and safety of our employees and patrons.

As we begin to readjust libraries to work in our new reality, things will be different. There will be limited hours and public health protocols in each branch, including limited capacity that can vary from 2 to 30 patrons. As per government reopening regulations, all patrons must either practice hand washing or use the sanitizing stations, wear masks, and practice physical distancing protocols. All library materials must be quarantined for 24 hours before being made available to the public/next person on the hold list.

MOOSE JAW/PALLISER continues to provide public library service in the following ways:

- Library employees are available to answer questions and provide support over chat, email and phone, during local branch hours.
- MOOSE JAW/PALLISER will continue to offer holds pick-up services by appointment at all locations.
- Book returns are open.
- Late fines are suspended.
- The Digital Academy is available on the Palliser website with over 80 courses that cover topics including beginner and intermediate tech courses, library e-resource tutorials, help with post-secondary studies and research techniques, and much more.
- Digital materials—including eBooks, audiobooks, music, movies and more—are available online through Hoopla, Library2Go/Overdrive/Libby, Tumblebook Library, Press Reader, Auto Repair Source, and Creativebug, among others.
- Summer reading and literacy activities are available online through the Moose Jaw website or the Palliser website. We also offer printed literacy activity calendars every month, which are also available for download on the Palliser website.
- We are offering online programming and online basic computer courses.

We will provide service updates and guidelines on our websites and social media. Thank you for your continued support and patience. We look forward to seeing you at the library soon.

2020 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING – May 1st 2020

A unique meeting to be sure! It was our first meeting using Zoom and the 5 issues that needed to be voted on were sent out to all towns, villages, RMS and delegates 10 days in advance and the results presented during the meeting. There were 20 participants. The following motions presented via Survey Monkey were:

The **Michael and Edith Klein Branch Library of the Year** was awarded to **Davidson Branch** and honorable mention to **Bethune Branch**. These libraries demonstrated exemplary patron services through library statistics, improvements to facilities, active board members, community partnerships, fund-raising projects, library promotions, programming, and compliance with Palliser Regional Library policies. The awards were presented over the summer in a COVID-safe manner.

2019 AUDITED STATEMENT

The 2019 statement showed no measurable gains or losses for the library. Any increases to reserves reflect the annual payments into the reserve accounts for equipment and software replacement of staff and public computers. \$256,926 (10% of our total collection value) was amortized. In 2019 we spent \$349,814 new library materials, online databases and e-books. Rural branches purchased another \$30,162 in materials through local funds and the materials grant.

FALL REGIONAL BOARD MEETING - November 6th, 2020



SUMA and SARM Exhibitors 2020

The 7 regional library systems worked together and ran exhibitor booths at both the SUMA and the SARM conventions. We demonstrated some maker kits and talked to people about library service and the renewed importance of libraries as a community hub and public space. The 2021 show is to be online so we will not be participating.

Branch Workshops and Training Opportunities

Big Talk for Small Libraries (Small Libraries Doing Big Things - Feb. 28th, 2020) was a free virtual conference put on by Nebraska Library Commission and co-sponsored by the Association for Small and Rural Libraries. Librarians were given the work time to watch it at home or in their own branch. The 12 sessions included "We NEED each other! Partnering with Local Organizations to Benefit Youth To Libraries: Spaces to Unite and Empower Communities." It was an excellent training opportunity and Palliser will be participating again on February 26th, 2021.

Kari Hennenfent attended the Public Library Association conference in Nashville, TN February 25th - 29th. Not only did she miss the tornado but also the start of international flight cancelations. While there she had the chance to connect with some of our Canadian vendor reps, attend sessions, see the sights, and met authors. One standout speaker during general sessions was Haben Girma, author of *Haben: The Deafblind Woman Who Conquered Harvard Law*.

All internal in-person branch workshops were cancelled due to Covid. Training continued through

The Digital Academy

In early April, Thanks to Kari Hennenfent, Brianna Miller and Mel Silzer-Frank, Palliser launched the Digital Academy. Since May 1st 2020 we have had 7019 courses taken. The first courses converted were the online courses that Brianna had been using as part of the Digital Literacy program (iPhone, iPad, Android, online banking...). Our next priority was to get the COVID PPE courses up online which provided instruction of safe use of masks and all other PPEs. All staff and substitutes had to take the course and pass it before they were allowed to return to work. As of January 28th 2021, we have 83 public-facing courses and 8 staff only courses, with more to come.



The Canadian Red Cross PPE and PPE Training Grant

The Canadian Red Cross provided a PPE grant to Palliser's branches. It gave us 6,300 gloves/mask kits. In exchange, we requested that all staff take the Red Cross PPE course. It served to reaffirm their training and, as a bonus, the Red Cross was paid \$5 per course taken by the Federal government – a very fair exchange.

TD Summer Reading Club & The Reader's Zone - 2020

TD Summer Reading in print form did not happen in 2020 across Canada. Staff from MJPL and Palliser HQ quickly got together and formed a virtual plan. We had to change to an online format including using Reader Zone which uses powerful tech to host reading programs for schools, librarians and organizations of all kinds. Uptake in the City of Moose Jaw (90 people reading 54,959 minutes) and the Rural Branches (80 children reading for 64,602 minutes) reflect Reader Zone captured data only. Not reflected in these statistics are the several branches that were able to run their own in-house designed reading programs with crafts (supplies and instructions) left curbside for pick-up, and Palliser's reading clubs on Facebook for each age group.

Aboriginal Services and Programming

In 2020, Palliser received **\$11,764** to help us enhance our First Nations services plus we received \$2,860 for Aboriginal Storytelling month. Palliser spent \$12,583 in 2020 on services to Aboriginal patrons. Palliser used the money for:

- Salary
- Materials (books, online databases, DVD's)
- Aboriginal programming



Aboriginal Storytelling Month- Joseph Naytowhow

Sponsored by Palliser, **Joseph Naytowhow**, a Cree Storyteller and elder, gave 5 wonderful presentations:

Avonlea had 108 participants: Joseph was going to do one session for older students but when he found out there were also elementary students he added on an extra session and did one for them as well. He sang songs, told stories and had the children of all ages help in acting out the stories as he told them.

Riverview High School, Moose Jaw had 114 participants. The Treaty Club at Riverview put up the Teepee in the gym prior to the event. Barb Fraser told a story. Joseph Naytowhow performed for the kids and invited them to participate in telling his stories. He invited everyone to do a short Round Dance after the stories were told and everyone in the gym participated for one song.

Moose Jaw Public Library: had 20 participants: Joseph told stories and sang songs. Some stories engaged the younger children in helping to act out the story. There was also some sharing in the circle that was led by Joseph related to gratitude and ways to keep calm. He then sang songs related to those themes.

Wakamow Valley Authority had 15 participants 10 volunteers: Family friendly fun outdoors with games, bannock on the fire and "Indian tacos"

Other Aboriginal Programs Sponsored

StoryTrails with Treaty 4 Gathering: During the week of September 15th, Treaty4Gathering Student Activities went virtual this year with no students attending on the Treaty 4 Grounds. Palliser actively participated by sending portable Story Trails to the following communities with the following FNIM titles.

- Davidson The Giving Tree by Leah Marie Dorion (note: the Story Trail's pages were destroyed by rain storm)
- Moose Jaw in Crescent Park Gift Horse by S. D. Nelson
- Avonlea School Fiddle Dancer by Wilfred Burton
- Willow Bunch Honouring the Buffalo by Ray Lavalee (postponed due to weather)


Kendra Weenie continued her December sessions and on January 20th had 10 participants attend her Painting Workshop in partnership with Saskatchewan Festival of Words and Wakamow Aboriginal Community Association. On January 22nd with she met with Phoenix Academy Students, making dream boards and looking at making goals for the future.

Centralized Inter-Provincial Library Loan - 2020

In 2020 we processed 3,119 requests. 1,277 came from in-province requests (Saskatoon, our largest borrower, did not come online until Dec 2, 2020) and another 1,291 out-of-province requests to find materials. We managed to fill 2,524 for a fill rate of 78%. The titles cancelled were cancelled for a multitude of reasons but often it was because they were (a) non-existent, (b) an e-book (can't be loaned), (c) no longer carried by libraries, or (d) unavailable in Canada. The cost for mailing to and borrowing from out-of-province Canadian public libraries and universities in 2020: \$5,685. This is a far cry from 2019 when it was \$22,595 but as of Dec 31, 2020, the majority of university libraries remain closed to interlibrary loans.

"A Geography of Blood" When Candace Savage and her partner buy a house in the romantic little town of Eastend, she has no idea what awaits her. At first she enjoys exploring the area around their new home, but as Savage explores further, she uncovers a darker reality -- a story of cruelty and survival set in the still-recent past -- and finds that she must reassess the story she grew up with as the descendant of prairie homesteaders.

We had a lot planned. Candace Savage was able to give her reading at Moose Jaw Public but not in Assiniboia in late March. Online presentations continued.

CNET / Palliser Computer Replacement (Evergreen Fund) Update:

EVERGREEN FUND RESERVE UPDATE: In 2020 Palliser purchased from the reserve for each branch a HP Color LaserJet MFP M479DW Printer that can print, scan, copy and fax. It is Wi-Fi enabled so, in addition to being able to print from library computers it can print from smart phones and tablets. The branches have signed independent contracts with WBM which provides them with onsite service, all parts, labour and toner. The cost is \$0.0255 per page for black and white and \$0.12 per page for colour. They have been encouraged to charge \$0.25 per page (colour) and \$0.15 per page b/w so as to cover their own expenses. The next projected drawn down/ bulk purchase of staff computers in 2021 or 2022 – COVID dependent).

CNET BANDWIDTH UPDATE – Good news re: bandwidth improvements are coming in 2021-2022. Dates for installation at each location remain to be announced. All locations except HQ (100), Moose Jaw (100), Assiniboia (TBA) and Davidson (25) will be going to 10 Meg from 3. Assiniboia is TBA because they are linked in with Southeast Regional College and Network Services is still considering what combined bandwidth they both need to operate efficiently.

Grants Received in 2020



Digital Literacy in South Central Saskatchewan

In January and February 2020 we were able to offer 5 sets of Samsung, iPhone, and iPad courses to 22 students. Then came COVID and we were able to, thanks to Mel,

Kari, Brianna and the grant, pivot quickly. We purchased the Niche Academy Service/Software and began creating our 91 online courses. From May through December we had 7019 online courses taken through the Digital Academy. This grant concludes on March 31st 2021 and we will miss the incredible opportunities for service that it allowed us to provide.



By thinking outside the "box", Palliser applied for and got a BC Literacy grant. In 2021, we will receive, \$20,000 for our project entitled "Re-Imagining Yourself in a Post-Layoff World". The goal of this one-year project is to use the Digital Academy to create tutorials to help people find new jobs and reintegrate into the workforce after layoffs cause by mine and pending power plant closures in Coronach. It has been expanded to include COVID-related layoffs.
