


# **2021 ANNUAL REPORT**

## 2021 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING - April 30, 2021

We had our 3<sup>rd</sup> Zoom-based Palliser Regional Library Board meeting. It went smoothly. The board was updated, the audited statement and policies were presented and passed in one hour. We had 16 board members and 8 observers in attendance. Jim Achtymichuk was re-elected Chair. The following people were elected to the Executive: from Moose Jaw: Sarah Simison and Jaimie Atkins. Our new rural representations are Shelley Potts-Weigetz (Riverhurst) and Marcy Ramage (Caronport). Greg Lawrence, MLA for Moose Jaw Wakamow, spoke and said that, "on behalf of himself and the Government of Saskatchewan he wished to thank everyone for the work that has been done throughout the region during the pandemic."

The Michael and Edith Klein Branch of the Year was not awarded to any one branch in 2021. Rather, the committee felt that all branches deserved recognition for the amazing work that they did for their communities during COVID and, to recognize them, we intend to have a "party" once we call all get together again (in person)

## 2020 AUDITED STATEMENT

The 2020 statement showed no measurable gains or losses for the library. Any increases to reserves reflect the annual payments into the reserve accounts for equipment and software replacement of staff and public computers. As per usual, 10% of our total collection value was amortized. In 2020, we (Moose Jaw Public and Palliser) spent \$346,112 on new library materials, online databases and e-books. The rural branches purchased another \$22,637 in materials through local funds and the permanent materials grant. ## Palliser and the Provincial COVID Fight

In late September, the library systems lead, by Saskatoon and Regina, and Palliser's strong written appeals to the government were declared to be essential services whereby the vaccination passport was not required for entry into the buildings. The argument was that libraries provided safe public access to computers and assistance to those wanting to download their vaccine passports, access to their e-Health records, access to job search and other reference requirements as well as materials to help the public with relaxation and mental health. Libraries, by their very nature, offered services to the disenfranchised, the unvaccinated and the general public while minimizing the risk to all.

In late November, Palliser, thanks to our relationship that we built through the CBC – the Community Based Coalition (Formerly the RIC) with **Gillian Froehlich**, Health Promotion Practitioner, Public Health Services, Saskatchewan Health Authority we became a distribution centre for the region of the Rapid Covid Test Kits. All 20 branches and HQ participated. In the case of most of the rural branches, the libraries, once the Co-op Gas stations had run out, became the sole source for these tests in the rural area. As of the end of March 2022, Palliser branches and HQ will have handed out over 15,000 Rapid Test Kits. Palliser HQ was directly requested to distribute the kits region-wide through the courier and to make the Test Kits available to the people of Moose Jaw South Hill. We did a booming business. We are definitely on the radar of Public Health.

## **Branch Workshops and Training Opportunities**

**Big Talk for Small Libraries** (Small Libraries Doing Big Things - Feb. 26<sup>th</sup>, 2021) was a free virtual conference put on by Nebraska Library Commission and co-sponsored by the Association for Small and Rural Libraries. Librarians were given the work time to watch it at home or in their own branch. It was an excellent training opportunity and Palliser will be participating again on February 25<sup>th</sup>, 2022.

**Palliser Branch Workshop:** Arwen Rudolph ran a fall online workshop for the staff – the first workshop in 18 months. It was held over 2 days; with each session being run 2 times so that the staff could choose a time to attend that worked with their schedule and branch activity levels.

## TD Summer Reading Club & The Reader's Zone - 2021

There were 966 participants in the summer reading club this year across the region. Of those, 234 also registered on the online platform we have used the last two years, called Reader's Zone.

## **Aboriginal Services and Programming**

In 2021, Palliser received **\$11,764** to help us enhance our First Nations services plus we received \$2,860 for Aboriginal Storytelling month. Palliser spent \$12,583 in 2021 on services to Aboriginal patrons. Palliser used our money for:

- salary
- materials (books, online databases, DVD's)
- Aboriginal programming

## **Aboriginal Storytelling Month**

Kim Soo Goodtrack of the Wood Mountain Lakota First Nation; author, artist and resident of Rockglen, enlightened us with 8 virtual presentations during the week of February 22<sup>nd</sup>. The presentations were made to schools in Imperial, Holdfast, Davidson, and throughout the Prairie South School Division. Kim Soo Goodtrack began each session with a prayer to The Creator and an explanation of the significance of the prayer and the past history when it was illegal for the First Nations to observe the rites of their Native Religion / Culture. She spoke of the importance and loss of the buffalo to the Lakota and others as well as how the loss evolved into the use of canvas, cloth, and the creation of ribbon skirts. She touched on the news story about the shaming of a little girl who wore her skirt for "formal day" at her school, here in Saskatchewan. To the older grade levels she also included a bit of residential school history. Her overall reaching message included being curious about other cultures but respectful in that we are all the same but all different. Along the way she introduced the

students to her books, TV shows, and art. In total Palliser was able to share Kim Soo Goodtrack with at least 450 students and over 30 staff members.

## **Other Aboriginal Programs Sponsored**

## **Treaty 4 Gathering**

Palliser Regional Library joined in partnership with Chinook Regional Library, Parkland Regional Library, Regina Public Library, Southeast Regional Library and the University of Regina Archer Library to host two virtual presentations in September to highlight The Treaty 4 Gathering. **Taneasha Francis** of Nekaneet First Nation began each program with a Welcome to Treaty 4. **Victor Lethbridge** joined **Carol Rose GoldenEagle** in conversation about what Treaty means to them as well as Victor's work as an author for an estimated 1500 K-5 classrooms. **David A. Robertson** joined **Carol Rose GoldenEagle** in conversation about what Treaty means as well as David's work as an author for an estimated 2000 Grades 5-8 classrooms. Both sessions were recorded and shared out to registrants allowing for those unable to attend to view at a later date.

# Centralized Inter-Provincial Library Loan - 2021

In 2021 we processed 5,942 requests. 2,329 came from in-province requests and another 2,513 out-of-province requests to find materials. We managed to fill 4,922 for a fill rate of 84%. The unfilled titles were canceled for a multitude of reasons but often it was because they were (a) non-existent, (b) an e-book (can't be loaned), (c) no longer carried by libraries, or (d) unavailable in Canada. As of Dec 31, 2021, the majority of university libraries were closed to interlibrary loans.

## **EVERGREEN FUND (Staff Computer) RESERVE UPDATE:**

The next projected draw down/ bulk for the purchase of staff computers in 2021 didn't happen due to COVID and the computer chip shortage which led to computer shortages and the resulting enormous price jumps.

# Digital Literacy in South Central Saskatchewan The Digital Academy 2019-2022

The contract with the Federal Government for the Digital Literacy Exchange program was extended for one more year. We received an additional \$75,204 to cover salaries and software costs. In 2021 **8,034 courses were taken**. The two most popular courses in 2021 were "How to use your iPad" and "What is a QR Code and how do I use it" (aka how do I get my vaccine passport). Congratulations to Mel Silzer--Frank and Brianna Miller who got this course up and running within 3 days of the government announcing the vaccine passport. From May 2019 through to December 31, 2021 DLEP offered 360 in person courses 15,053 online (Niche Academy) courses. Students have some from across Saskatchewan, Ontario and British Columbia. They produced 56 staff tutorials and 87 public tutorials on

By thinking outside the "box", Palliser applied for and got a BC Literacy grant. We will receive in 2021, \$20,000 for "Re-imagining yourself in a post-layoff world". The goal of the 1-year project was to create, using the Digital Academy, tutorials to help people find new jobs and reintegrate into the workforce after layoffs. Due to our inability to travel, it morphed into "Get the Soft Skills Edge" training. Kari Hennenfent pivoted the

program and taught 9 sessions via zoom. COVID put a major dent in our plans and ability to deliver as most other training agencies were also facing similar problems in attracting "students".



## **Canada Healthy Communities Initiative 2021**

## Follow the Plot Story Trails

Imagine walking down the community walking trail with your child and you come upon a page from a children's book. As you continue walking, you find another page, and then another and you begin to realize you're on a Follow the Plot Story Trail.

Although we asked for \$97,000, we received \$30,000 in federal funding to help us install story trails in the 8 locations: Rouleau, Bethune, Holdfast, Davidson, Elbow, Tugaske, Rockglen and Willow Bunch. In spite of the shortfall, we are going through with it due to the benefits that it offers the communities. The stations are being manufactured for us by Shadow Ranch of Mossbank. If "planted" correctly, the stations should withstand Saskatchewan weather and the gentle 100 KPH prairie zephyrs.

Craik was the first in the province to build their own trail. The Kids First have agreed to put trails in Moose Jaw (2), Assiniboia, and Mortlach while Loreburn has an agreement from store owners to put the trails up in their front windows. We will be providing "books" to all 14 locations and would consider supplying all new trails within the Palliser area.



## South West District for Culture, Recreation & Sport 2021 Micro-Grant

On November 5<sup>th</sup> we received a \$500 Micro grant from the South West District for Culture, Recreation & Sport. It will be used to purchase another 10 sets of books for all of our branches with Story Trails.
